





Recently rediscovered and restored by IndieCollect, *Brighton Beach* is a priceless portrait of the Brooklyn neighborhood that came to be known as "Little Odessa." Capturing the diversity and charm of an enclave that hasn't been homogenized by gentrification, the film is a precious time capsule that draws on archival footage as well as new photography to observe the quirks, charms, and occasional tensions of this unique slice of NYC. 1980. 60 m. Made in the 1920's to portray everyday Jewish life in the U.S. amidst a rising wave of antisemitism, *Breaking Home Ties* was long thought to be lost before it was lovingly restored in the 1980s by the National Center for Jewish Film. The film tells the story of David Bergmann, who fled pre-revolutionary Russia for New York thinking he killed his friend in a jealous rage. THE HEARTBREAK KID APR. 29, 4:00



Documentary portraits Janis Ian: Breaking Silence and Charles Grodin: Rebel with a Cause reveal in both subjects an incredible resilience and ability to grow. ADA-My Mother the Architect, a candid and artful portrait, will bring well-deserved attention to a true pioneer. The engaging biopic Midas Man may be about the rise of the Beatles, but its focus is on the amazing and tragic story of their manager Brian Epstein. A mix of exciting films, both new and old, rounds out the lineup: from quietly powerful dramas and coming-of-age debuts to archival treasures and charming documentaries, as well as family-friendly screenings like the Marx Brothers' comic masterpiece Duck Soup. Finally, a Sunday morning panel will kibbitz about the surprising wealth of outstanding Jewish-themed films in 2024.
